## How to Survive - Naviance is Key

## Want to know what career you should go into?

Go to the "about me" page and take all of the assessments. Here, you can find your strengths and the jobs that utilize these traits. The results give you a detailed description of who you are and what job you should look into. This will be helpful for when you try to figure out what major you want to study.

## Want to know which college to go to?

In the "colleges" tab there is a "SuperMatch college search" that allows you to find a college that best fits you. This should be your first step when looking for a college. After you have done the match, you should add the colleges you are applying to and see if any schools you are interested in are visiting Winter Park. Click on the "my colleges" section to view the latest college visit updates. It is important to do a lot of research on each college to make sure you identify with the school's mission. This investigation can be done through any of the "college research" tabs. However, if you just click the name of the college in your "SuperMatch," you will be directed to a site full of information about the college.

## Want to know if you have a good chance of being accepted?

Go to the "colleges I'm thinking about" and add any colleges that you are interested in. Once you have a list, click the name and scroll through the information. Here, you should see the deadlines, acceptance rate, and your test scores compared to past applicants. This will give you a good idea of the schools that you might be accepted to. You have to make sure to add all of your information, like your scores, in the "about me" tab. This will make it easier for you to find colleges that fit your personality.

## Want to save some money?

Apply for scholarships! Naviance makes the scholarship search easy. Scroll down the "colleges" page to "scholarships and money." If you haven't used Naviance a lot, click "national scholarship search" to scroll through various scholarships that match your profile. To find scholarships that you meet the qualifications for, you must create an accurate profile. This can be updated by clicking "edit profile." If you are planning on applying for a scholarship, you click the scholarship link, select "planning to apply," "save to favorites," and go to the scholarship's website.

## **IB Glossary**

- HL Class (Higher Level) A two year course in which students develop a deeper knowledge of the subject matter. Students take this exam at the end of their senior year. Each student has three HL courses. At Winter Park, all students are required to take HL English and History. One of the more popular HL courses is Psychology.
- SL Class (Standard Level)- A one year course that provides a general overview of the subject matter. Students will take the SL exam at the end of the course, either in their junior or senior year. To receive an IB diploma, students need to score an average of four on each SL examination.
- **IA Internal Assessment -** A written paper for every IB class with an exam . This paper counts towards the overall exam score, but do not worry, the IA is meant to help the exam score. In order to graduate high school, all IB Students must turn in an IA, so make sure to talk with a teacher to clarify any questions.
- CAS Hours Creative/Active/Service Hours A system that tracks extracurricular activities. The official CAS hour log begins the summer before junior year. To complete CAS hours, another graduation requirement, 60 hours are needed for each letter. Take the advice of the older and experienced IB students—do not wait to start your CAS hours! Attempt to accomplish the majority of the CAS hours during the summer! ## **IB Survival Guide**

IB students sometimes have mountains of homework, so it can be challenging to make time for extracurricular activities. However, if you can manage your time wisely, you will discover an ideal balance between work and activities. Here are some suggestions for organization:

- 1. Make a homework folder, one side for homework assignments that need to be finished, and the other side for completed homework.
- 2. Keep an ongoing list of things you need to have done, for both homework and extracurricular requirements (i.e. beta points, IA due dates, etc.).
- 3. Find an efficient order in which to do your homework. Some students work chronologically, starting with either their 1st or 7th period. Another way to work could be according to difficulty: starting with your least challenging assignment and working your way up.
- 4. Look at assignments as smaller pieces of a whole. Instead of putting off an entire book to read until the night before, start with a few chapters a week.
- 5. Teachers will tell you not to procrastinate (and it's good to listen), but it's better to plan out your week logically according to your schedule and assignment deadlines.

#### All the Crooked Saints - Maggie Stiefvater




